A recent study was carried out by Southern (2018, unpublished) regarding the clients with PMLD accessing Community Learning Disability services in Hull. From this it was found that within Hull (population estimated to be 259,000 in 2018) there were approximately 74 individuals classified as PMLD. This is slightly less than expected from Emerson's study. A further reconciliation of data was carried out which included care homes and the number of people who would benefit from this service is approximately 102. Data sources: 1. How has engagement informed your service specification?		Engagement has taken place via the PMLD subgroup which is a sub group of the Learning Disability Partnership Board in Hull. It is attended by parents and professionals working with clients with PMLD. Following the unique experience of having a specialist consultant available to support clients with PMLD the sub group identified that there was a need for a specialist doctor in learning disability services with a background in general medicine and palliative care that could support the complex interplay of health conditions that a person with PMLD will experience and provide holistic approach. The outcome of the previous post and this project has become of national interest. This work was promoted at the Differently Abled Event on February 14th 2019. NHS Improvement have agreed to evaluate this program of work following the first year. A leading newspaper is also proposing to publish an interview with a carer from Hull who has a daughter with PMLD.
