





# CHIEF OFFICER'S UPDATE July 2019

# Welcome to the Chief Officer's Board update for July 2019 featuring news and highlights from NHS Hull CCG.

I have been overwhelmed by the supportive comments, via email, twitter and face to face, for the CCG achieving an Improvement and Assessment Framework (IAF) rating of 'outstanding' for a third year running.

As always, I am incredibly proud of my CCG team who strive every day to do what they can, where they can, for our population. This rating is testament to the culture of the organisation and the way we work.

NHS England recognised that the CCG has continued to demonstrate and maximise a strong partnership approach in the city, including the expansion of out of hospital care strategy, innovation in primary care and leadership on key pieces of work for the Humber Coast and Vale Health and Care Partnership.

It was acknowledged that it has been a very challenging year for us, particularly in the light of the delivery of the NHS constitutional targets. We were, however, able to show our continued commitment to working across the system to try to deliver and improve these targets, wherever we can influence.

2019-20 will be the last time we are rated as a single organisation. The IAF is evolving to take a wider system focus in line with the establishment of Integrated Care Systems and we will begin to be rated as a whole system - combining both commissioners and providers. As NHSI and NHSE come together over the next year it is likely our system will receive a rating in shadow form.

We are now a well-established part of the senior leadership of the city, which has remained stable over the years, creating good conditions on which to build.

Trust and good relationships matter as much as governance and organisation structure—if we have these then we stand a good chance of moving the city on, as all public services are inextricably linked.

I am pleased we had a 'double hat-trick' in achieving six years of 'unqualified' accounts. To have this kind of accolade shows the robust control we have on our resources and is further evidence that the schemes we invest in that are less traditional still demonstrate good value for money, which is important.

Hull CCG also achieved a 'green star' rating patient and public involvement – the highest we can receive. This is a signal of how thorough and proactive our public involvement work is and how firmly it is embedded within our commissioning.

I was pleased we had follow-up media interest in the newly -commissioned Homeless Discharge Service after it was highlighted during the event. The new service, which will begin in October, is a superb example where a new approach is being adopted to support some of the most vulnerable people in Hull to avoid repeat admittance to hospital.

birthday party was a truly fabulous event with more than 100 patients, members of the community, centre staff, fire



and rescue staff and others turning out in the sunshine on 5 July.

Highlights included the Humberside Fire and Rescue K9 Dogs Team display, a performance by Estcourt Primary School and community singing (and lots of flag waving) led by the Hull-based Choirboys. to be there due to ill health, but her presence was felt thanks to her special opening day video screening and a bee-

themed cake.

I would love to bottle the joyous feeling I always get from the people, patients, the clinical staff, wider ICC support team and café team.
