Next Steps for Integrated Care Systems

Work continues at pace as we transition towards the Integrated Care System. As I write, the constitution of the Integrated Care Boards (ICBs) is out for consultation across the country and the CCG Board is in the process of feeding back comments on the draft. The constitution of the Board is fundamental in how we are going to operate as an ICS, and the recent work to develop the Humber operating model will feed into that. As I have outlined previously, we have now identified the executive leads for the four Places, which includes Hull. From a Provider Collaborative and Place perspective we need to be focusing on our populations and the current executive leadership at local authorities will help us do this, in the interim.

I know that many CCG staff members are working on the due diligence and transfer of statutory responsibilities necessary for our Readiness to Operate Framework. We've made good progress in recent months and this is due to the hard work of the members on the five strategic partnership boards and CCG staff teams.

Winter and service recovery

As we approach the Christmas period, this is going to be one of the hardest winters we are going to have to deal with, and I recognise NHS staff, as always, for their efforts with day-to-day system pressures. We need to do all we can as a health and care system to

ensure people access the right places for help.

I was pleased to see the new city centre vaccination centre open this month in



Princes Quay, adding to the sessions that have continued to be provided by our primary care network teams, supported by volunteers.

The centre offers booster appointments seven days a week from 8am to 7.20pm. It's not too late to get your first jab – or even your second or booster jab and information is available at www.nhs.uk help you book your appointment.

Our NHS primary care and community workforce, is still in the middle of delivering the largest vaccination programme the UK has ever known. We have both COVID-19 and flu circulating now, so it is important to get the right jabs to protect you, your family, and the people you meet. The flu vaccine is available now. It is safe, effective and protects millions of people each year. If you are eligible, you can make an appointment through your GP or pharmacy – whichever is more convenient.

Hull's Jean Bishop Integrated Care Centre has been in the news for more happier reasons as the Parkinson's team gained an award for outstanding care from the UK Parkinson's Excellence Network in late October.



Hull's "Parkinson's hub" was commissioned by the CCG. Members of Parkinson's UK were consulted and listed education, quick access to specialists, expertise from healthcare professionals and quicker medication changes as priorities for a new community-based, multidisciplinary service offering comprehensive

assessments. The Hub, led by Consultant Geriatrician Dr Tom Mace now provides vital support to people with Parkinson's, their carers and their families in one place, preventing multiple visits to different clinical teams at different locations around the city. I know that Jean would be proud to see that the ICC has gone from strength to strength, offering the best experience of care for people with Parkinson's in Hull.

Next generation

Away from work I attended the Hull and East Riding Business awards recently. It was great to see the Hull Children's University as nominated charity getting some well-deserved additional funding and recognition for the work they do.
